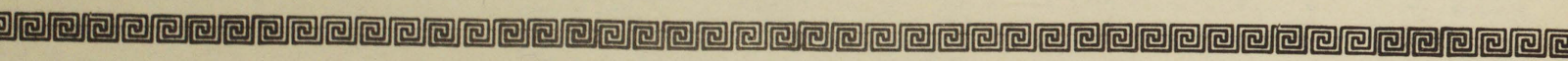
INTRODUCTION

On September 16, 1978, just 168 years after the Grito de Dolores was sounded to mark the beginning of the struggle for Mexican independence, a few dozen people met in the parochial elementary school at Mission San Xavier del Bac, Tucson, Arizona, to discuss a common love and common interest. It was the "Southwest," the southwestern United States and northwestern Mexico. Those present at the day-long meeting came from throughout the state of Arizona and included both professional and lay people. There were biologists, hydrologists, folklorists, historians, archaeologists, cultural anthropologists, writers, artists and artisans. There were housewives, students and teachers. There were, in short, people from various walks of life — all of them come together to share in an animated dialogue concerning the state of Southwest studies as well as possible future courses of action in this regard.

One unanimous recommendation of this amorphous, no-name group of Southwesterners was that there should be compiled a preliminary directory listing the names, addresses, telephone numbers and interests of people who have a commitment to Southwestern studies. Those who were at the San Xavier meeting suggested dozens of other individuals, and these were contacted and invited to be included in the present directory.
